## Students Union Submission to the Academic Plan 2005

At large research intensive campuses such as the University of Alberta it is essential to create an undergraduate learning experience that allows students to maximize the return on their investment in post-secondary education. There are many important elements involved in creating such an experience; in this submission we will focus on the three emerging themes that we feel are most pertinent for the students at the University of Alberta now and in the upcoming years.

## 1. Engage and Connect

An enhanced undergraduate experience starts and ends with each individual student. We must create mechanisms by which University of Alberta students are connected to campus from their first semester here, and follow this with techniques to continue their engagement throughout the undergraduate years.

*Use Relationship Management:* Create a start to finish techniques of holding students attention in the university.

*Provide Undergraduate Research Opportunities:* Increase the chance of undergraduate students continuing their scholastic pursuits by providing them with opportunities to work more closely with professors to pursue individual interests.

Develop More Cohort Based Programs: Extend the cohort program to include a greater number of faculties and students. By grouping students in smaller classes the university can facilitate the formation of student support and friendship networks.

Connect Commuters to Campus: Create meaningful experiences outside of the classroom to encourage students to remain on campus. Facilitate transportation to the university and provide ample convenient study spaces.

## 2. Student Support

Support and guidance for students by academic staff, non-academic staff and affiliated groups on campus is essential to improving the undergraduate experience. At every point of contact with students the University of Alberta must strive to meet and exceed their expectations of care.

*Improve Study Space:* Create convenient and accessible library locations with extended hours for students to study both on week days and weekends. Continue

to support the 24-hour study space initiative in order to provide all night access to safe study space for students.

*Technology Support:* Provide current and user friendly software for courses. Upgrade hardware on campus to ensure that it is accessible to all students.

Academic Advising: Provide appropriate guidance to students throughout their undergraduate career to help support the important decisions they make and the paths of study that they choose.

'Help Out not Weed Out': Strive to eliminate the mentality that first year classes are a survival of the fittest competition. Students should feel supported in their attempts to learn in a new environment and the university should be accommodating to these students' individual needs and challenges.

## 3. Improving Teaching

Teaching is one of the most essential factors in meeting the needs of our undergraduate students. There are many important areas that the University must focus on in the upcoming years in order to maximize the contribution of excellent teaching to the undergraduate experience.

*Re-Evaluate Teaching Evaluation:* Actively seek out new ways to improve student contributions to teaching performance reviews. Search for new models of surveying students that reflect professors' real abilities to help students meet the learning goals of the university.

*Emphasize Teaching Skills in Hiring Decisions:* Examine the need for students on hiring boards. Examine professors' past records of teaching excellence and make hiring decisions based on these factors.

Support Professional Teaching Development: Strongly consider the benefits of developing a for-credit program of seminars and courses for graduate ad PhD students that will aid them in improving their teaching skills.

## **D.I.E. BOARD RULING #9**

## STEVE SMITH vs. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE STUDENTS UNION II

### SUMMARY OF ALLEGATIONS & FACTS

The DIE Board met on Monday March 21, 2005 to hear a complaint brought forward by Steve Smith. The complainant alleges that the agreement reached between the Students' Union and studentcare.net/works on January 11, 2005 is a public document in accordance with Section 1 (3) of Students' Union Bylaw 500. As well, the complainant alleges that the Executive Committee is in contravention of Sections 2 (1) and 3 of Bylaw 500 by reason of its failure to make the document available to all Students' Union members.

On January 11, 2005 the Student's Union and studentcare.net/works agreed on a contract for the provision of health care coverage to Students' Union members. The agreement was contingent on approval by the student body in the form of a referendum. In order to better inform the student body and to provide transparency the Executive Committee of the Students' Union placed a copy of the agreement on the Internet. The agreement was ultimately rejected in the referendum. The Executive Committee has since determined that the agreement is properly confidential and that they had erred in releasing it to the public. In order to correct this error the Executive Committee removed the agreement from the Internet and from the Students' Council agenda. However, a complete document (with legally sensitive areas blacked out) is available for students with valid ID to read in 2-900 SUB. This document cannot leave the office and photocopies cannot be made.

## Bylaw 500

## A Bylaw Respecting Access to Students' Union Information Classification

- 1. ... (2) Every Students' Union document or record is confidential that has not been designated strictly confidential and that ...
- (c) if divulged, could compromise the legal position or business competitiveness of the Students' Union.
- (3) Every Students' Union document or record is public that is neither strictly

confidential nor confidential.

## **Access to Information**

- 2. (1) Public information is available to all members of the Students' Union.
- (2) Confidential information is available to
- (a) members of Students' Council and committees thereof;
- (b) members of the Executive Committee;
- (c) members of the Discipline, Interpretation, and Enforcement Board;
- (d) such employees of the Students' Union as the Executive

Committee considers appropriate; and

(e) any individuals designated by Students' Council.

## **Cost to Members**

3. Any member of the Students' Union requesting a copy of a public Students' Union document or record shall be provided such a copy, at a cost to that member not exceeding the cost of the document or record's retrieval and reproduction.

### **ISSUES**

- 1.) Is the agreement reached between the Students' Union and studentcare.net/works on January 11, 2005 a public document in accordance with Students' Union Bylaw 500?
- 2.) Who has access to the agreement under Students' Union Bylaw 500?

### **DECISION**

D.I.E. board has been asked to determine if the agreement between the Students' Union and studentcare.net/works is a public document. The classification of a Students' Union documents according to Students' Union legislation is within the D.I.E. board's jurisdiction to interpret Students' Union legislation.

Three categories of documents are set out in Bylaw 500. First, strictly confidential documents may be designated as such by Students' Council in accordance with section 1.(1). Second, confidential documents are created through operation of section 1. (2). The Bylaw does not contemplate any process for the designation of documents as confidential. As well, the power to designate a document confidential is not specifically conferred on any person or office. Thirdly, section 1. (3) makes all Students' Union documents public that are neither strictly confidential nor confidential. In order to find that a document is a public document, it is necessary to first find that the document is neither strictly confidential nor confidential. On the evidence D.I.E. finds that the agreement between the Students' Union and studentcare.net/works could compromise the business competitiveness of the Students' Union and is confidential according to section 1.(2)(c).

The agreement is confidential and so access to it is limited to those people listed in section 2(2) of Bylaw 500. Confidential documents should not be accessible to all members of the Students' Union. D.I.E. board appreciates the document in question has historical interest and that it is good practice for the Students' Union to remain transparent to its members. Nevertheless, the document available for viewing in 2-900 SUB is either a confidential document or a public document. If the document is confidential, then it should not be available for viewing by

Students' Union members. If the document has been altered substantially enough to make it a public document, then Students' Union members must be allowed to make copies of it as set out in section 3.

D.I.E. Board thanks parties for their reasoned submissions and, in particular, the Executive Committee of the Students' Union's candour in accepting responsibility for their error.

## Ruling #10 Ruling of the Discipline, Interpretation, and Enforcement Board Jones v. Chief Returning Officer

## **Summary of Facts and Allegations**

Chris Jones is an undergraduate student registered in Open Studies. Mr. Jones wants to run for a SU Councillor position. SU Bylaw 2200 § 8(b) ["Bylaw"] sets out procedure for nominating and electing SU councillors. The Bylaw stipulates that nominees are required to obtain at least ten signatures from students enrolled in the same faculty as the nominee. Mr. Jones argues that due to the nature of the Open Studies Faculty, he was able to obtain only one signature. Mr. Jones argues that it is virtually impossible to collect ten signatures considering the fact that the majority of students in Open Studies are part time students, dispersed throughout the campus. Further, Mr. Jones argues that the Bylaw discriminates against students enrolled in Open Studies because, in effect, it creates an insurmountable barrier to completing a valid nomination form as required by the Bylaw.

Mr. Jones argues that SU Bylaw 700 § 2(h) guarantees him the right to be a member of the Student's Council. Further, Mr. Jones contends that § 8(b) of the SU Bylaw 2200 is in conflict with § 2(h) of the SU Bylaw 700 and requests that D.I.E. Board harmonize the two bylaws.

The Respondent acknowledges that the requirement of ten signatures as set out in 2200 § 8(b) is harsh for students registered in Open Studies. However, the Respondent contends that Mr. Jones failed to take prudent measures in contacting students in Open Studies. Additionally, Mr. Jones decided to run for SU Councillor position only a very short time before the deadline for submitting the nomination forms. Further, the Respondent contends that Bylaw 700 and Bylaw 2200 are not in conflict, therefore there is no need to harmonize them. Alternatively, if the

bylaws are in conflict, the Respondent argues that the D.I.E. Board doesn't have jurisdiction to harmonize them.

## **Relevant Provisions**

Students' Union Bylaw 2200 § 8(b):

- 8. The nomination packages shall contain, at minimum:
- (b) nomination papers soliciting the name, contact information, and student identification number of the proposed nominee, and the names, years, signatures, and student identification numbers of at least ten (10) and at most twenty (20) members registered in the same faculty as the nominee as nominators;

Students Union Bylaw 700 § 2(h):

- 2. All members of the Students' Union (...) shall have full Students' Union privileges, which shall include:
- (h) the right to be a member of Students' Council, if qualified and if properly elected.

## **Analysis**

The Appellant demonstrated to the satisfaction of DIE Board that achieving the required signatures for his nomination package was a task of some difficulty. This difficulty, however, does not have the effect of denying the Appellant his right to become a member of Students' Council "if qualified and if properly elected" as stipulated in s.2(h) of Bylaw 700. Indeed, it was still quite possible for the Appellant to complete his nomination package. As such, the rights afforded in Bylaw 700 are not infringed by the provisions of Bylaw 2200 and the two statutes need not be reconciled.

The Appellant's second submission that the requirements of Bylaw 2200 (specifically s.8(b)) were discriminatory against Open Studies students was generally accepted by DIE Board. Inasmuch as it is harder for an Open Studies student to meet the required signature threshold than for a student in any other faculty, there is a substantive, if not formal, difference in treatment. When pressed, however, the Appellant was not able to cite any Students' Union statute or precedent that prohibits such discrimination. In the absence of any such law, DIE Board refuses to change statutory law duly passed by Students' Council.

This is not to say that the Appellant's arguments are wholly without merit. Indeed, the hardship placed on Open Studies students in completing their nomination packages will inevitably have a detrimental effect on that program's representation on Students' Council. Students' Council would be wise to investigate this matter and act accordingly.

Appeal dismissed.

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## a) Nature of Operations

The Students' Union, The University of Alberta is incorporated under the Universities Act of Alberta. The Students' Union is tax exempt with respect to corporate income taxes under S.149(1)(h.1) of the Income Tax Act. According to the Universities Act, The Students' Union is to provide for the administration of the affairs of the students at the University of Alberta, including the development and management of student institutions, the development and enforcement of a system of student law and the promotion of the general welfare of students consistent with the purposes of the University of Alberta. As such, The Students' Union represents approximately 34,000 undergraduate, full-time, part-time and inter-session students at the University of Alberta. The mission of The Students' Union is to be an organization for students which represents students in an effective and accountable manner, provides programs and services that meet the needs of students, enhances the image of both the University of Alberta and its students in the greater community, provides opportunities for the interaction and personal development of students, and fosters a sense of spirit and community on campus.

## b) Inventories

Merchandise inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost is determined on a first-in, first-out basis. Net realizable value is defined as selling price less costs to sell.

## c) Interest in Properties

Interest in properties are recorded at cost. Management provides for amortization using rates designed to amortize the cost of the capital assets over their useful lives. The annual amortization rates and methods are as follows:

Furniture and office equipment	20%	<b>Declining Balance</b>
Computer equipment	30%	<b>Declining Balance</b>
Leasehold improvements	20%	Declining Balance
Students' Union Building and improvements	50 yrs	Straight Line

Amortization is recorded as a reduction in Net Assets Invested in Properties. The art collection is not amortized as management has determined that no decline in economic value has occurred. Full amortization is recorded in the year of acquisition and none in the year of disposal.

## d) Appraisal Increase in Art Collection

On August 18, 1989, The Students' Union, The University of Alberta recorded an appraisal increase in its art collection in the amount of \$129,300. There was a corresponding increase in Net Assets, Appraisal Increase on Art Collection.

## e) Revenue Recognition

The Students' Union, The University of Alberta follows the restricted fund method for externally restricted contributions and follows the deferral method of recognizing revenue from all other sources. Unrestricted revenues are recognized as either general revenue or departmental revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Restricted revenues are recognized as revenue specific to the reserve or fund to the year the revenue is received. Rental payments received in advance of the year to which they relate are deferred.

## f) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. By their nature, these estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty and the effect on the financial statements of changes in such estimates in future periods could be significant.

## g) Long Lived Assets

Long lived assets comprise investments and interest in properties.

Long lived assets held for use are reviewed for impairment when certain events or changes in circumstances indicate that he carrying amount of an asset may not be recoverable. The recoverability test is performed using undiscounted future net cash flows that are directly associated with the asset's use and eventual disposition. The amount of the impairment, if any, is measured as the difference between the carrying value and fair value of the impaired assets and presented as an additional current period amortization charge.

During the year there was no impairment of long lived assets.

## 2. INVESTMENTS

Investments consist of various Government and Crown Corporation securities and units in mutual funds and an endowment pool. The investments are recorded at cost. The market value of the investments as at April 30, 2004 is \$3,651,266 (2003 - \$3,248,079).

### 8. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Financial instruments consist of recorded amounts of accounts receivable, advances, accrued interest receivable and investments which will result in future cash receipts, as well as bank advances, accounts payable and accruals, and long-term debt which will result in future cash outlays.

The floating rate debt is subject to interest rate cash flow risk, as the required cash flows to service the debt will fluctuate as a result of changes in market rates.

## a) Credit Risk

Credit risk arises from the potential that a counter party will fail to perform its obligations. The Students' Union is exposed to credit risk from customers. However, The Students' Union has a significant number of customers which minimizes concentration of credit risk.

## b) Fair Value

The carrying values of the financial instruments noted above approximate their fair values.

## 9. FURTHER INFORMATION REGARDING RESTRICTED AND UNRESTRICTED NET ASSETS

The following information has been enclosed to assist the reader of these financial statements.

### Capital Equipment Reserve

The capital equipment reserve is used to purchase items of a permanent nature.

## **Project Reserve**

The Project Reserve is set up for organizational projects that arise. The reserve is funded by the Single Source Cold Beverage agreement.

## World University Services of Canada Reserve (W.U.S.C.)

Sponsor a refugee student to attend university at the University of Alberta.

## Campus Recreation Reserve

Administers the request made each year for funding of non-varsity athletic programs and campus recreation related programs.

## Student Legal Reserve

Provides free legal assistance and public legal education to the students of the University of Alberta and the community at large.

Administers the requests made each year for funding by the various athletic teams on campus.

### Access Fund

Students contribute to this fund that provides students with emergency bursary support.

## **Eugene Brody Fund**

Donates funds to various charities on behalf of The Students' Union.

## Students' Involvement Endowment Fund

Scholarship fund set up to provide the public the opportunity to make a tax-deductible contribution towards the scholarships created by The Students' Union.

## **Building and Tenant Reserve**

This is a Students' Union reserve to be used for any potential building costs.

## Alberta Public Interest Research Group Reserve (A.P.I.R.G.R.)

The Alberta Public Interest Research Group exists to serve the public interest by engaging in research, education, and action on issues related to social justice and the environment.

## Sponsorship Reserve

Provides administrative and fundraising services to all departments of The Students' Union.

## Campus Crime Stoppers Reserve

Provides funding to Crime Stoppers on campus in order to raise awareness of and to decrease crime on campus.

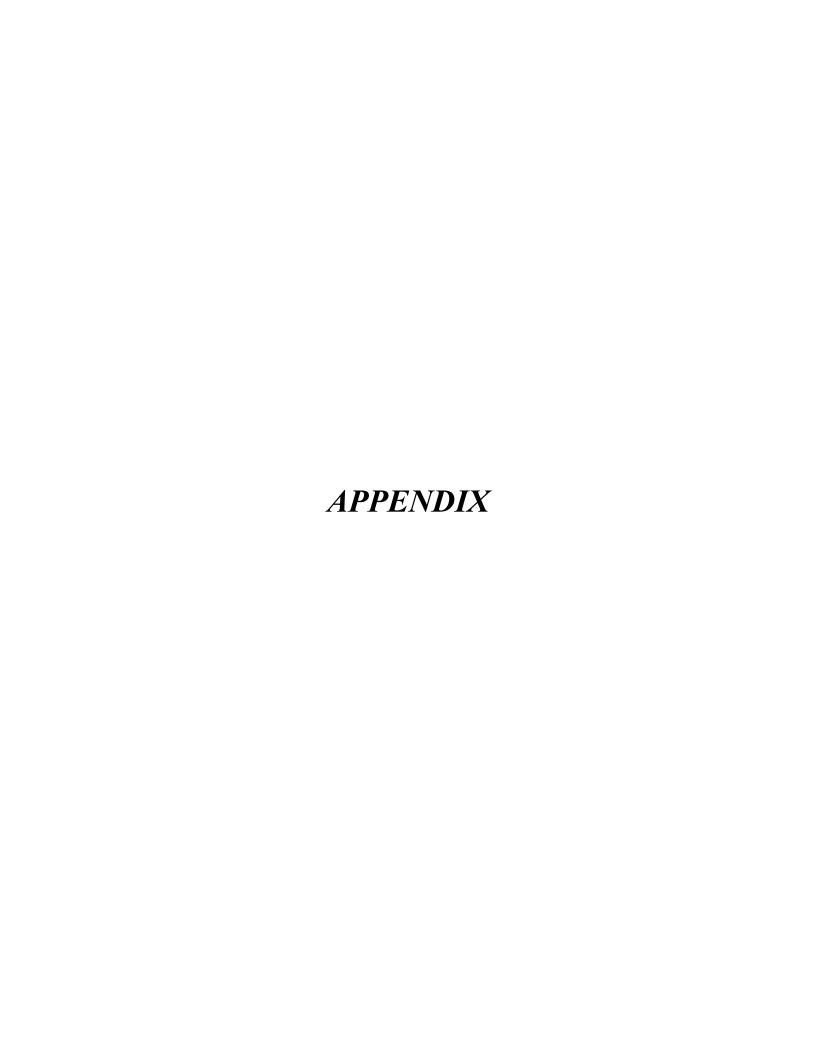

### Refund mechanism

For students that are opposed to the Faculty Association Membership Fee, for whatever reason, they are allowed an opportunity to refund their payment. The rules governing this refund mechanism are outlined in the ESS Policy B.2.7 located in the Appendix. In accordance with this policy, a deadline for students to apply for a refund was set for 4:00pm on Monday, December 6<sup>th</sup>. Students are going to be made aware of this deadline two weeks in advance through the EnggLink e-mail list, the Engineers' Handbook and the ESS website. Their payment will be refunded within one month of the ESS receiving the funds from the Students' Union, as per the policy.

There were no refunds given this year.



### B.2.5 Distribution of Faculty Association Membership Fee

### Relevant section of proposal to Students' Council regarding FAMF:

### Scope

The Engineering Faculty Association Membership Fee is intended to replace the current Engineering Students' Society membership fee structure in order to create opportunities for student involvement and support engineering student activities.

### Financial Oversight

The Engineering Students' Society will require financial statements from the recipients who are not the ESS or ESAF indicating the anticipated expenditures to be made with the allocated funds. The Faculty Association Membership Fee funds received from the Registrar will be held separately from the remainder of the ESS' funds, under policies established by the Board of Directors and approved by a General Meeting.

The ESS will also require annual reports indicating how funds received from the fee have been spent from each of the recipients (excluding the ESS and ESAF) by February 15 of each year, and compile a report for Students' Council by march 15 of each year indicating how the monies have been spent. The ESS will report to Students' Council as required by Bylaw 8451 and fully comply with any other legislation adopted by Students' Council with respect to financial oversight. The ESS will also open its books to Students' Council or delegated bodies for inspection under reasonable terms of access with respect to the fee.

The Board of Directors of the Engineering Students' Society is delegated the authority to require from each of the recipients that they provide to the Board a satisfactory accounting of their spending of fee money, and may withhold allocated funds if such an accounting is not provided. A General Meeting may overturn, uphold, or vary the decision of the Board of Directors. The Financial Affairs Board of the Students' Union will be advised of actions taken by the Board of Directors and General Meetings.

### **Definitions:**

- <u>FAMF/ESAF Account</u> account held with the Faculty of Engineering to be used for the Faculty Association Membership Fee (FAMF) and the Engineering Students' Activity Fund (ESAF)
- <u>ESPF Account</u> account held with the Faculty of Engineering, called the Engineering Student Projects Fund, to be used for the Student Projects
- ESPF Committee committee for the distribution of funds in the ESPF Account, governed by the ESPF Bylaws

### **Policy:**

- 1. Distribution of any funds allocated by a General Meeting to student projects recognized by the ESPF Committee will be conducted as follows:
  - a. Projects submit proposals to ESPF Committee, outlining the project's budget for the upcoming year including the amounts and items to be purchased with FAMF funding
  - b. ESPF Committee approves an allocation of the funds available from that term, based on the submitted proposals
  - c. Projects must document how FAMF funds are spent, and submit this information to the ESS as outlined in section 4, below
- 2. Distribution of any funds allocated by a General Meeting to discipline clubs recognized by the ESS will be conducted as follows:
  - a. Clubs submit proposals to the Board of Directors, outlining the club's budget for the upcoming year including the amounts and items to be purchased with FAMF funding
  - b. Board of Directors approves release of funds available from that term, based on the submitted proposals
  - c. Clubs must document how FAMF funds are spent, and submit this information to the ESS as outlined in section 4, below
- 3. Distribution of any funds allocated by a General Meeting to the ESS for specific purposes will be immediately upon receipt of the funds from the Students' Union.
- 4. Recipients who are not the ESS must provide the following information to the ESS no later than February 15
  - a. Detailed receipts for items spent in accordance with submitted proposals
  - b. Summary of how students have benefited from FAMF funding being allocated to that club or project
- 5. Recipients who are not the ESS that fail to submit the information outlined in section 4, above, may have additional allocated funding withheld, at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

### B.2.6 Faculty Association Membership Fee Administrator

### Relevant section of Students' Union Bylaw 8451:

12. The Faculty Association shall submit a report detailing the operations and administration of its funds to date, including the refund provision, to Students' Council by November 15 and March 15. Additional reports may be requested by Students' Council, but must allow a reasonable time period for submission

### **Policy:**

- 1. The Faculty Association Membership Fee Administrator will be appointed annually by the Comptroller.
- 2. The Faculty Association Membership Fee Administrator will report to the Board of Directors.
- 3. The Faculty Association Membership Fee Administrator will perform those tasks associated with administering the Faculty Association Membership Fee.

### B.2.7 Refund Mechanism for Faculty Association Membership Fee

### **Relevant section of Bylaw 8451:**

10. A Faculty Association Membership Fee shall have an option for those who are philosophically opposed or unable to pay the fee to be reimbursed. The Faculty Association will provide for this refund, within the scope of the proposal approved by Students' Council per section 7 (c).

### Relevant section of proposal to Students' Council:

### Refund mechanism

The Engineering Students' Society will be responsible for administering the refund mechanism. Engineering students must provide written notification of their intent to optout of the Faculty Association Membership Fee during the term that they have been paid. The Engineering Students' Society shall reimburse these students within one month of receiving the funds from the Registrar's Office.

### **Policy:**

- 1. Members who have paid the Faculty Association Membership Fee will have the opportunity to have their contribution refunded, if they are philosophically opposed or otherwise unable to contribute to the fund.
- 2. The deadline for requesting a refund is decided by the Faculty Association Membership Fee Administrator, and must be at least one week in advance of the funds being distributed as per *B.2.5 Distribution of Faculty Association Membership Fee*.
- 3. The opportunity to refund a FAMF contribution, and the date of the deadline to request this refund, must be well advertised to members through several media formats at least two weeks before the deadline.
- 4. Members must complete the form available through the ESS, and submit it in hardcopy to the ESS office by the deadline mentioned in section 2, above.
- 5. The ESS will, upon verification of the members' payment of the FAMF, refund this contribution by whatever means available no later than one month after the ESS has received these funds.
