Hope you stayed warm this weekend! My partner and I made sure to be stocked up on hot chocolate for Sunday so was pretty swag.

## Board of Governors and Governance Committee

I am thrilled to a inaugural member on the new Board of Governors Governance Committee sitting this Thursday! The BoG is reviewing its entire board structure right now! I am looking forward to working through new board committee mandates and a new structure for membership. Most importantly, the Board Governance Committee, in conjunction with other bodies, will be discussing and deliberating how new legislation and budget practices will work in our governing system, including things like approving fees, rents, or tuition. The BoG is having a comprehensive institutional plan briefing and strategy session this Friday, and I'll be able to further update council in the coming weeks.

## CSJ Town Hall

I was in attendance at the CSJ town hall on the 30th and VP Brown lead that discussion. Although a good portion of the hall was in French, I was able to get some good notes and look forward to going back for council!

## Residence Budget Advisory Committee (RBAC)

Following our last meeting with RBAC we anticipate that rent rates will be going up by 5% at the University of Alberta and meal plans by the consumer price index (CPI). This is in line with the Universities 3-year budget proposal from 2017/18. I continued to bring up our concerns in regards to continued increases especially as these increases are pushing residence into the upper limit of the rental market in the immediate area and are becoming increasingly unaffordable for students (a student can no longer cover the cost of residence, meal plan, and tuition on the maximum full-time student loan). The committee also had a brief discussion about what an appropriate method of calculating inflation would be for residence, so that administration can budget in a continued long-term manner. I continue to push for the standard of CPI, however, this discussion will likely be coming to the BoG within the next year.

## Candidate Meetings

I have tasked our external advisor to push for the UASU to meet with as many provincial candidates for the upcoming provincial election, including those candidates from outside of Edmonton. We have a few meeting lined up, of note though, was that VP Brown and I met with Kara Baker, the candidate for the UCP in the University riding. She was a supporter of the University community, including a lot of our approach to generating more students in Alberta. I look forward to building relationships with folks from all parties and lets hit this election running!

### To Note:

- I intend to host a last-minute elections boot camp next week or during the reading week if time permits! The intent is to give some tips and tricks for those are last minute entries (folks like myself back in the day) to make the campaign a little more accessible.
- The executive attended the Alberta Anti-Racism Framework Consultation and gave feedback on how to best integrate the framework onto the UAlberta campus.
- The executive committee spent the day on 1st at an in-house retreat in which we prepared for the transition.
- Met with the Director of Athletics and Recreation to go over recent updates in the VSU scenario in Ontario and their new budget model.
- The Strategic Planning Committee has completed a draft and I will be presenting that to council at the next council meeting, time allowing.

Not too much has changed since our last meeting, and I will be sending my regrets to today's meeting to attend a Golden Bears and Pandas Legacy Fund meeting. Nonetheless, here are the updates on the projects I've been working on!

### 1. HUB Residence

The University committed funding to support safety and security in HUB Mall! Congratulations to everyone who helped get this project off the ground and stuck with us throughout the process. The University and The Students' Union continue to seek feedback from students on HUB:

### 2. Post-Secondary Standards for Mental Health

Several campus stakeholders are involved in a national conversation to establish standards for mental health across Canada. We are incredibly excited for the opportunity to participate in the project, and look forward to seeing the results of the consultation.

### 3. Board // GFC // Senate - Joint Summit

On January 25th, the Board of Governors, Senate, and GFC members came together to discuss the joint position paper from COPPOA, the Council of Post-Secondary Presidents of Alberta. The position paper outlines 3 major goals for Alberta Post-Secondary Education.

- 1) Increase the available seats in post-secondary institutions.
- 2) Grow the amount of up-front grant available to students from low-middle income families.
- 3) Increase the amount of funding available for research and innovation.

While all three strategic areas are undoubtedly important for the student experience in Alberta, I feel concerned that there is no mention of ways to improve student life beyond financial assistance. It's important that we don't limit discussion of other

important issues such as mental health, sexual violence supports, and reconciliation efforts.

This is particularly relevant considering the Sexual Assault Centre protested the summit and outlined several concerns regarding the University Appeals Board and the University's approach to sexual violence practices. We look forward to a response from administration, and will continue to advocate for more immediate action from the university to make their policies and procedures fair and student-friendly.

#### 4. East Campus Students' Association

The East Campus Students' Association is back! They hosted their first event since getting an executive team together and had over 100 people attend. It was amazing!

#### 5. Closing

Earlier last week, CBC posted an article highlighting a student who had been evicted from their residence for self-harming. I would like to reiterate that under no circumstances is a letter like this ever acceptable, and the Students' Union strongly advocates for more supports for students who experience mental health struggles. The Students' Union remains in contact with the Dean of Students concerning this issue, and have received verbal confirmation that since October 26th, 2016, no such letters have been sent to students. This is a clear example of a case in which University administrators were not sensitive or aware of the complexities and nuance of student mental health, and confirms the necessity for on-campus mental health services and practitioners to help administrators respond to students at risk effectively, empathetically, and ethically.

Food security, when all people, at all times, have physical and economic access to sufficient, safe and nutritious food to meet their dietary needs and food preferences for an active and healthy life, is essential to the mental and physical wellbeing of students, and as such may significantly impact their academic success.
2. Food insecurity at the University of Alberta is significantly higher than in Canada as a whole.
3. There is a stigma surrounding food insecurity, which is viewed as a normal rite of passage in university.
4. Many students depend on food purchased at outlets on campus.
5. Access on campus to sufficient options for students with specific dietary needs including, but not limited to, vegetarian, vegan, kosher, halal, culturally appropriate, and allergen-free food.
6. Access on campus to healthy and nutritious food is currently limited by both insufficient options and price.
7. Access on campus to affordable food options is limited.
8. Nutritional information provided for food products on campus is currently limited.
9. Access to food preparation facilities on campus is currently limited.
10. Students living in Lister Centre and Peter Lougheed Hall must purchase mandatory meal plans

## 2 Resolutions

1. The Students' Union advocates that the University increases the availability of diverse and healthy food and beverage option.
2. The Students' Union advocates that the University provides an increase of affordable food and beverage options.
3. The Students' Union advocates that the University provides and improves access to food preparation resources.
4. The Students' Union advocates that the University provides and improves access to water fountains and water bottle refilling stations.
5. The Students' Union advocates that the University encourages the sale of organic, local; or Fair Trade certified food and beverage options when competitively priced to reduce its adverse ecological and social impact.

11. Some residences have limited food preparation facilities, however they are typically insufficient for regular full meal preparation.
12. Many students lack education and awareness of healthy eating and the options that are available on campus.
13. Students have access to organizations including the Campus Food Bank that work to assist with food security.
14. The production, distribution, and consumption of foods and beverages can have adverse social and environmental impacts.

## 2 Resolutions

1. The Students' Union shall advocate that a food outlets serving a variety of cultural, religious, and medical food needs be made available on campus.
2. The Students' Union shall consider affordability and cultural, religious, and medical factors in selecting food outlets in spaces controlled by the Students' Union.
3. The Students' Union shall collaborate with partner organizations such as the Campus Food Bank when possible to reduce food insecurity.
4. The Students' Union shall advocate for improved access to food preparation facilities on campus, such as water fountains and water bottle filling stations and microwaves.
5. The Students' Union shall

advocate that residence meal plans be affordable and offer nutritionally, culturally, religiously, and medically appropriate food to all students in residence.

6. The Students' Union shall advocate for education about healthy eating, and for nutritional information to be provided at campus food outlets.
7. The Students' Union shall advocate for environmentally and socially responsible food to be provided on campus, when available at affordable prices.
